


### Q1

### What questions do you have about the arena and performing arts venue proposal?

Questions entered here will be provided anonymously to the city in the hope of gaining more information and clarity.

- 1. What is the breakdown of low and middle-skilled jobs for the Potomac Yard arena proposal? These jobs are great for Alexandrians that would like to work closer to home and provide upward mobility for lower-income residents. What are the impacts real estate, sales and use, and hospitality taxes as a result of this project?
- 2. How will traffic be mitigated in Rosemont? I am specifically concerned about Commonwealth Avenue.
- 3. How many permanent jobs (full-time) will be created? if Monumental and arena don't go in, what alternatives would take their place. Something is going in, right? what might it be? Any serious offers?
- 4. We are being asked to commit to financially support a project, and we aren't given any detailed financials on initial cost, operational, cost, environmental cost, including both embodied and operational carbon, operational cost and recapitalization expenses and that's just for the building complex. We have limited information about the cost of the Infrastructure both for transit, water, and.power. There is absolutely no consideration mentioned about the sustainability goals for the project, nor the impact on the region and its historic significance. There are no convincing studies of what the impact will be to both the Washington DC and ALEXANDRIA region when it comes to jobs. Will it make new jobs? Or just shift jobs? Will these be event related jobs or full-time jobs? In addition, I resent the condescending attitude of just trust us we've got it covered we know better than you, and the fact that there is no provision for a referendum to gain approval for the project. I understand that referendum are not typical, but this is a huge impactful project, and the citizens should be first well informed and then consulted.
- 5. This is a bad deal on so many levels from the financing to the traffic to the lost opportunity to the fans who would have to travel greater distance to a significantly less accessible location. Capital One has two metro stations close by served by six lines whereas PY serves two lines in a small station that even with improvements will suffer 30-45 minute waits after events. How is that good. The more information that comes out or is put out by the proponents just makes it worse. My favorite is the use of Audi Field as a comparable to the new arena by the K-H traffic study and the claim that improvements made for the area around Audi Field would help the PY arena. I attend soccer games at Audi and traffic there is a nightmare with traffic control officers on many of the nearby intersections to help with pedestrian / traffic interaction. The arena plan says nothing about who foots the bill for that so it will likely be the City of Alexandria. I this is such a good deal, Monumental should put up all the money itself or hold ten years of bond payments in escrow to cover revenue shortfalls rather than leaving it on the backs of Alexandria and Commonwealth taxpayers.
- 6. What will happen to the stores at Potomac Yard? We cannot afford to lose some of the few stores remaining in Alexandria. Has a truly unbiased cost/benefit anaysis been done, ore are the city and state elected officials basing their support on the smoke and mirrors numbers being presented by the advocates? What are the risks associated with the plan? Why are our elected officials in Alexandria, particularly our mayor, so supportive? They behave more like Chamber of Commerce Republicans than Democrats. Does our governor have a personal/business interest in the plan? Why shouldn't we ask Monumental Sports to pay for infrastructure improvements and pay their own way?
- 7. Why was our listserve data used without permission?

- 8. DETAILED accounting of how much of the 1.5B indebtedness associated with the project will be covered by a/the city; b/ the state ; c/ Mr.Leonsis. What is the proposed distribution of the income from the project will be allotted to the three groups identified above? DETAILED analysis of how much of the cost of Metro upgrades (including expansion of the station at the site) can actually be covered by money the governor claims he is willing to have the state guarantee. What is the likelihood that the General Assembly will approve such an increase? DETAILED time line for completion of the project. Explanation of penalties to be assumed by contractors for time line delays. DETAILED estimates of costs for time-line delays and what group will pay for them. Explanation of what the city believed were commitments about Alexandria's participation in the governing committee for this project. Why/How did the composition of that group drop to minimal participation for the city? What approach will the city take to regain more representation on that body?
- 9. What will happen to the target?
- 10. Having visited the site, I think it is obvious that access to the site is too constricted for such an arena. There are not enough ways into or out of the site to allow for so many attendees to gather and then disperse at around the same time. Why would the "leadership" focus on such an inappropriate site for this use? The traffic in the surrounding areas is already horrendous and cannot absorb even a portion of such an intensive use.
- 11. My main concerns are about traffic impacts, ingress and egress from the Potomac Yard area and significant concerns that inadequate studies have been done on this front and that no one truly understands the additional infrastructure investments that will be required for Metro, roads, parking and other public transit impacts. What needs to be done to minimize congestions and adverse impacts on surrounding neighborhoods and who is going to pay for it? What is the additional investment in policing, security and other public services that will be required over time? I want to hear that from the police, not from Ted Leonsis, Glenn Youngkin, or the mayor and city council.
- 12. I want the City to address the following traffic mitigation ideas: 1. Zoned parking stickers to Lynnhaven, Del Ray and Rosemont residents (free of charge). 2. Signal synchronization from I-395 in Arlington to I-495 beltway in Fairfax (keep cars on main artery). a. In 2016, T&ES representative indicated to Advisory Group this technology is possible. b. Requires coordination with Arlington and Fairfax. Start now. 3. Allow parking on both sides of the street in Lynnhaven, Del Ray and Rosemont (create yield streets). Be creative if emergency services concerns, stagger the on-street parking. 4. Enforce "No Through Street" signage on days of Arena events. 5. Add bollards along Route 1 entrances to side streets in Lynnhaven and Del Ray. 6. Increase throughput for PYD Metro Station (a must!). 7. No Arena sporting event may start before 7PM on a weekday (allow commuters to get home before traffic rush). 8. Exit at the PYD Metro station < 1 hour BEFORE an Arena event and the cost is \$1. 9. Enter at the PYD Metro station < 1 hour AFTER an Arena event and the cost is \$1</p>
- 13. My main guestion is with cost. It will cost a lot to build the stadium, and the city of Alexandria and Virginia will be on the hook for a huge portion of it. Tax revenues, realistically, will not pay for the construction and definitely will not cover the costs of maintenance, support (policing, etc.), and all of the auxiliary items necessary for the stadium (transportation -- it is already a mess in the area and bringing in more cars will clog an already saturated road network). They will be building a stadium with underground parking along a river that floods, and where the water table is already high. There is no plan to increase funding for WMATA. Jobs at an arena are event specific; you can't just be hired and work full time. These are hourly jobs that pay minimum wage, and minimum wage is not enough to allow anyone to live in the Alexandria/Arlington area. There is insufficient housing for public servants in the city; increasing the number of lower wage workers means those workers have to come from somewhere else. In the immediate area around the proposed stadium site there are insufficient restaurants/bars to accommodate event attendees. Realistically, no one is going to eat in Crystal City or downtown Alexandria and then go to the event. You want to eat close by and walk there. And again, these are primarily lower wage job creators that would be dependent on arena traffic. A multipurpose arts venue might be nice, like the THEARC in SE, or put a decent aquatics facility (swimming and diving) that could be used by both Alexandria and Arlington.
- 14. How many events will be hosted yearly? Of what type?
- 15. Why do we need an arena?!?!
- 16. I want to see all the data generated from an independent analysis. I also want to see a clear delineation of who pays for what.
- 17. How will the traffic issues be resolved? How will the City ensure that this is a money-making venture? What percentage of the resulting revenue will be used to improve ACPS? Will city residents be able to vote in a referendum to either support or oppose the arena?

- 18. What other development opportunities were explored and how do the economic impact projections of them compare to the stadium? Why would the city and state agree to the billionaire owner paying no property, sales, or income taxes? For how much are taxpayers on the hook if the rosy economic projections don't come to be? Why would we want to steal these teams from our neighbors in DC? How will we ensure the independent entity is incentivized to minimize expenses and doesn't pay themselves huge salaries/bonuses to reduce reported net income?
- 19. Please explain the assumptions supporting the projected revenues and the details of the economics so that we can understand how much risk the City and the Commonwealth would undertake as guarantors of the bond payments.
- 20. 1. Why didn't they panned the camera to the audience a few times at the Town Hall no context on how much pubic interest there was ? 2. Transportation story ignored the points re GW Parkway and Slaters Lane short cut to Rt 1- and Arena traffic causing delays for people/drivers trying to get to the airport on game nights for their flights or pick-ups 3. Consider and explain the cumulative effects and community fatigue of transportation and new buildings Infrastructure projects King St / Russell 4th railroad line new large buildings north end Route 1 from Madison St to East Glebe
- 21. I've read no current tax dollars (city or state) will be used, but what about future City tax dollars? Why should I as a tax payor, be providing tax dollars for a private venue?
- 22. Traffic
- 23. Effect on traffic, noise levels, congestion, livability, house values, quality of life, crime, etc.
- 24. There is only one road available to access the arena, how will the city be able to manage traffic so as it does not overwhelm Route 1 Why are there only 2,500 parking spots? This is far too few and will result in traffic spilling into neighborhoods
- 25. What is the actual revenue that will be generated and go to the city? How many jobs and the people in them will transfer from m the District? What is the alternate timeline plan for the property if the arena is not pursued?
- 26. Why is this even being considered? Why would we want to uproot a billionaire's sports franchise located less than 5 miles away and transplant it to Alexandria? What happens when Ted Leonsis or the next owner decides they can make even more money by moving the complex out of Alexandria years before the contract ends, as they are doing to the District of Columbia, where their lease was supposed to be until 2047???!!!!!
- 27. The current transportation plan sees the Potomac Yard fans parking in the Rosemont and Del Ray neighborhoods and using the metro stations that are nearby, as per the slides presented on 2/1/24. We need answers on how parking restrictions in those neighborhoods will be enforced and who will pay for property crimes that always accompany rowdy crowds of fans on city streets. We also need answers on the state's commitment for upgrading the Potomac Yard metro station to handle expected crowds and when we will see it in the state's budget. Please see the Washington Post article, dated December 14, 2023, about the Virginia Squires, a team that was temporarily in our state (at: Virginia had a pro basketball team once before. It didn't go well.) It should serve as a warning that we could see a repeat with the current proposal. We need an item in the state budget that will cover all costs incurred by the City of Alexandria for a theater and parking garage until they produce the revenue that will pay for them.
- 28. Will the jobs created be full-time, living-wage jibs, or part-time, low-wage positions? What will the real economic impacts be? How will traffic be managed when our roads already are so clogged?
- 29. What is the possibility of having the arts venue income removed from the authority. It may be in competition with the Birchmere not a good idea.
- 30. Why move the arena to Virginia when it's DC teams playing ? How will you handle the already bad congestion? How will you handle already existing problems with Potomac Yard Metro?
- 31. Why is there no commitment to long-term support from Virginia to the Potomac Yard Metro Station? How will the development impact traffic and the environment? Why is the city and state expected to pay for this private-sector business? We keep hearing that this will create many jobs in Alexandria, but we have heard nothing guaranteeing that those jobs will go to local residents. Why not? Currently, parking at the Potomac Yard retail development is free. Will residents have to pay for parking at the new retail space that's going in? How do you plan to keep sports and concert fans from parking in adjacent neighborhoods?

- 33. What specific plans are there to manage the traffic and parking congestion that will be created? How will the Metro be supported to handle the crowds? Who will pay for it? Have any jurisdictions made spsecific and binding commitments to provide financing? Why is Monumental, with its billionaire partners, investing so little compared to what they expect from the City? Who will provide and pay for security at Arena events? How will the neighborhood be protedcted from noise and litter, especially after CAPS games?
- 34. Why are the economic growth projections for the arena complex so far greater than the actual economic growth documented in every peer-reviewed academic analysis of other stadium and arena projects nationwide? What are the multipliers used to make those projections and what source did they come from if not from any peer-reviewed academic source?
- 35. 1. Increased Crime 2. Increased traffic on RT1 Already busy between Potomac Yards & Crystal City
- 36. Parking on DelRay side streets. Congested roads.
- 37. Exactly how is the development to be financed? Exactly how will residential property owners (tax payers) be impacted if: -the development proceeds as proposed; and -if there are failures to generate revenue as proposed. We already have a "master plan" for the Amazon H2Q development that addresses many of the same quality of life issues that the arena proposal raises: number/quality of jobs; traffic and transportation; retention and increase in affordable housing; etc. How will the arena proposal coordinate or not with the Amazon proposal? What lessons can we learn from Amazon development? Past and future flooding is a major concern for Alexandria residents. How will the arena proposal address mitigation of flood risk for the city and surrounding areas?
- 38. How will cut through traffic in adjacent neighborhoods be mitigated?
- 39. How sustainable will the developments be? Net zero buildings? Onsite renewables? All-electric utilities? Dedicated bus lanes? Dedicated bike lanes? Few parking spots?
- 40. This plan became public immediately after the passage of Alexandria's "Zoning for Housing" initiative, despite overwhelming public opposition to ZFH. What is the relationship of the two initiatives, both of which seem to be being pushed through by the developers who stand to profit from them. What is the real involvement -- and potential profit motive -- of Alexandria's mayor and city council in this "related" initiative?
- 41. Where will the \$200M+ from Virginia come from and what may be cut to make this funding available? Where will the \$100M from Alexandria come from and what may be cut to make this funding available? How many trees will be cut down or removed from Route 1 and Potomac Avenue for this project? How is this project climate sensitive and ecologically sustainable? What are the traffic & related impacts of the 200+ events to be held at the arena besides the Wizards & Caps games? The Wizards are one of the worse teams in the NBA and the Caps are struggling. What are the impacts and risks associated with below-projection revenues for the Arena, both in the short-term & long-term? How will the current Arena site & Chinatown area in DC be financially viable for the long-term without hockey & basketball? How will the Mystics venue in Anacostia be financially viable if the Mystics? The proponents for the new Arena talk about the number of jobs created for Alexandria & Virginia. How many jobs will be lost in DC when the Caps & Wizards relocate? What is the net job impact of this project?
- 42. The projected number of people driving to the events seems to be low compared to when I attend games at the Cap Center and Nationals Park. How will our roadways handle all the extra vehicular traffic when they are congested already, especially at rush hour?
- 43. None.
- 44. How can we leverage the economic benefits of the Arena area development to fixe out low-rated school system?
- 45. Is there any example in the US of a stadium deal that didn't put taxpayers on the hook for a project that also benefited billionaire owners?
- 46. I'm concerned about increased traffic, crime, and decreased property values. I'm also concerned about the aesthetics of the development on the community.
- 47. How will it affect me?

- 48. How much of the ~1.5b debt will Alexandrians be left with if the project fails, or Monumental leaves as they now leave DC, or goes bankrupt? Is this the best deal we can get from Monumental, or will they accept a smaller handout? How do we justify this poor treatment of our sister city across the river? What else could be done with the land parcel, and \$1.5 of municipal/state bond funding support, over the next couple decades (don't compare with status quo)? Isn't our Best Alternative to instead redouble our work on a sci/info/tech/arts innovation center? Monumental Arena, with hotdogs and gambling and giant LCD signage, seems a shiny distraction from, if not a deterrent to, a real knowledge-based economic engine for Alexandria and VA.

- 50. Just how much control will Alexandria citizens and government have over the development? Who will actually pay to enlarge the PY metro station to handle the crowds? What will the effect be on real estate taxes in Rosemont based on what benefits to the average homeowner?
- 51. The downtown arena attracts amplified street performers, drug dealers, and drunk attendees. What will prevent that from happening at PY?
- 52. I would like to know the position of each Alexandria City Council Member, the basis for that position, and whether they have considered the various studies demonstrating that the project is a bad idea. If they have not considered such studies, why haven't they? If they have considered such studies but disagree with them, what is the basis for their disagreement? I also would like to know if the City has hired outside experts, including legal experts, to evaluate this project, and if the City hasn't, why not. More generally, I've had enough of the Council's "listening" sessions. We need sessions where individual Council members have to respond to questions from their connstiyuents.
- 53. What traffic studies have been completed that actually analysis the impact of this project to traffic along Route 1, and the already challenging situation where residential neighborhood streets are being used as alternate routes by non-residents of Alexandria to attempt bypassing the current levels of traffic on Route 1, I-395 and the GW Parkway? We are an island surrounded by interstates, railroad and Metro tracks, and the river, so exactly how can traffic not increase, and further flood residential streets not intended for this purpose, given the fixed number of major vehicular entry points into and out of the city?
- 54. 1. The mechanisms and certainty of the "catalyzed" additional development. 2. The quantification of the lost revenue from debt service and other tax diversions due to the arena as well as the quantification of revenue gained from the potential other development. 3. Specific engineering or technical assessments of improvements required to the potomac yard metro station pedestrian bridge and their cost and feasibility.

### Do you have any other concerns not covered above?

- 1. If this project goes through it will be another signal of the loss of the ability of residents and businesses to participate in decisions that affect them. I do not believe this project would be going forward with the total approval of our Council and Mayor if we had neighborhood representation via wards.
- 2. I believe there would be increased retail opportunities, not fewer. But keeping Best Buy, B&N, and Target are key.
- 3. Sports and other gambling will likely be coming along with the arena. It's unclear if Monumental Sports Network (MSN) will be profitable in the long term which could impact management's investments in the teams. MSN is a recently formed business that arose out of the difficulties of regional sports networks (Comcast Sports Net in this case). While the theory is that a team controlled network will work better, what if that isn't the case some years down the road. There has been no discussion or comparison modelling on the lost opportunity from the arena deal compared to mixed-use development. The City of Alexandria just passed their version of Missing Middle to improve housing in the city (which I strongly supported) and for years has lamented the lack of housing in general and affordable housing in particular. To then turn around and take twelve acres of mixed-use development near transit out of the picture is ridiculous. And last, the Wizards have been terrible for years, the Capitals have not won a playoff series since their 2018 Stanley Cup (and missed out last season), and Alex Ovechkin will be retired by the time the arena opens. Attendance has been down and no-shows have been up which means less spending by fans and less tax revenue to pay off the bonds making the rosy projections by proponents not so rosy.
- 4. Why are so many of our elected officials so in favor? It doesn't fit the philosophies of either Democrats or Republicans. I may be overly cynical, but I think they may be putting their interests over ours.

- 1. The relocation on Monumental Sports HQ along with the relocation of the Wizards and Capitals provides Alexandria with a transformational economic development opportunity to increase the commercial tax base in Alexandria, provide upward mobility for lower-income residents to work in the community they live in, and provide a destination for the region which will increase business for small businesses in the City of Alexandria.
- 2. My biggest concern is that promises from the developer (entertainment, restaurants, easy access) require guarantees from the City/State (public financing, road improvements, etc.) That's not a fair balance. There should be a provision for City/State to "claw back" funds if projections are not met. There is huge value in developing adjacent land, for example, that is directly related to the developers. If visitor or revenue projections are not met the City/State should be compensated by receiving ownership interests in adjoining land. The developer should have to grant interests to the City/State based on a sliding scale of project performance. If performance is at expectations, developer keeps it all. If it falls below, the City/State gets a cut of adjoining interests.
- 3. I think there is more support for this than you may be hearing.
- 4. The sports teams belong in DC at much more accessible Capital One where they are centrally located for the fans. The financing (it's a billion dollar giveaway to a rich sports team owner) puts the onus on Alexandria and Commonwealth taxpayers to backstop any shortfalls. 
- 10. It's billionaire welfare.


### How long have you lived in Alexandria?


# Gender: How do you identify?

# What is your age?


